Call to Order

Cynthia Greene called the meeting to order at 7:02 p.m.

Roll Call

October 4, 2023, Minutes were approved as written.

Staff Updates

Police Update - Chief Marcia Harnden

Chief Harnden opened by reviewing the statistics snapshot to the end of October. Violent crimes are up 20%, while robberies have only increased slightly. Cynthia Green asked for clarification on the definition of the different kinds of larceny, specifically the "other" category. Chief explained it is a type of catchall theft, like off a porch.

Due to the bill that closed the Measure 110 loophole, user levels of fentanyl have been recriminalized. There will be a push to change 110 even further, as well as trying to repeal it altogether. Currently the available options to combat drug use are limited. Chief Harnden stated that the law as it exists right now is a failure. Overdose deaths in Albany are up 600% since 2019. Native Americans are one of the demographics most affected. Drug courts have potential as a diversion from usage, however many of those resources and staff have gone away. She states that we have "no teeth" to persuade the public to use services, and the services they do have available are dwindling. With fentanyl being the worst drug to withdraw from, it makes the incentive to get clean that much harder to find. There is more cocaine available as well. With the rise in drugs comes a rise in crime, and the drug-related deaths are due to double from last year, with 101 deaths due to fentanyl. With every overdose death comes a narcotics team response. Police are at full staffing which means more officers are making self-initiated calls. They are 3,551 calls up from last year. Hiring is going well, with ten staff hired, five of whom are officers. There is one pending officer hire in February.

Fire Update - Deputy Fire Chief Chris LaBelle

Chief LaBelle began by reviewing the call numbers, which show AFD has slowed down since summer on calls, but the numbers are still up on structure fires. Motor vehicle collision numbers continue to be up as well. The numbers have decreased for fire and life safety evaluations. There are two firefighters on light duty currently who will fill in, so AFD will see those numbers increase. The department has hired four paramedics and one EMT intermediate for the single-role program. These new hires have been brought on to specifically staff peak activity time periods so AFD will have full coverage. Chief confirmed that one of the new hires used to work here, and has decided to come back, bringing lots of experience with him. There have also been two promotions: Ray Wooldridge and Hans Reerslev. Chief Wooldridge will take over our EMS division chief position and LT Reerslev will fill the Lieutenant vacancy.

In further news, the City Council has extended their approval to begin the process of obtaining two new remounted medic units; however, AFD is still 15 months out from having those in the stations.

A request was made by Cynthia Green to have a rotation of the firehouses for future meeting spots. While two of the stations have limited room for meetings, stations 14 and 15 would be available.

Guest speaker- Fire Community Risk Reduction

Sandy Roberts attended to speak about the Albany Fire Fighters Community Assistance Fund (AFFCAF). This is a non-profit organization started by firefighters who wanted to be able to solve needs in the community as they saw them arise. The funding for AFFCAF comes from community donations, firefighters, and fundraising events like the annual golf and cornhole tournaments, Antiques in the Streets, the Bottle Drop, and selling hats, shirts, and sweatshirts. This program provides many resources to the community such as life jackets, car seats, and taxicab rides. These rides could be for people who need to go to the hospital and don't have a medical need to ride in the ambulance, or who need to get somewhere for a job interview and don't have a way to get there themselves, among others. Cynthia Greene asked about the return rate on life jackets; Roberts says it is a 60-70% return rate but because of how many are donated and the grant AFFCAF receives every year to purchase more, AFFCAF can focus more on them getting used and less on how many get returned. AFFCAF accesses other programs as well to save money, like Fish of Albany and the Red Cross.
